Ciders, cheeses, music at Arts Center event Oct. 14

SANDISFIELD — Tom Christopher will host a hard cider tasting at the Sandisfield Arts Center on Saturday, Oct. 14, at 5 p.m.

The tasting will feature the products of several outstanding producers matched with local artisanal cheeses and the music of Moonshine Holler.

In the early 19th century, Sandisfield had many apple orchards and was once known for its hard cider, which was a thorn in the side of the local temperance leaders.

Approximately 30 years ago, Christopher began making hard cider, this once ubiquitous beverage that had almost disappeared from the local scene. Since then, a multitude of fine cider makers have sprung up all over New England.

Christopher will speak about the history of cider making in the region and then invite the audience to taste a flight of ciders from a variety of makers, both amateur and professional.

"We'll explore a range of flavors and styles of cider, from traditional New England farmhouse ciders to European inspired ciders from some of the best cider houses in the region," explained Christopher.

Training session for severe weather spotters free to the public

MONSON — The National Weather Service in Taunton is sponsoring a severe weather spotter training session for Hampden County, part of its Skywarn program, on Monday Oct. 16, from 6:45 to approximately 9 p.m. It will be held at Memorial Hall, 198 Main St., Monson.

The session is open to all at no charge, and is being offered by the six Hampden County Medical Reserve Corps units in honor of National Preparedness Month. Amateur ("ham") radio operators, emergency managers, police, fire, and other first responders are encouraged to attend. Everyone age 16 and older who completes the training will be eligible to become trained NWS weather spotters.

The free training session includes a computer-based presentation covering development of thunderstorms, "severe" thunderstorm criteria, as well as the cloud features associated with severe thunderstorms and tornadoes; winter storms and proper snow mea-

surement; reporting of coastal flooding, river, stream and urban flooding and rainfall measurements, as well the procedure for reporting weather information to the National Weather Service. Safety procedures for the various forms of summer severe weather, winter storms and flooding will also be covered. Bringing a notebook with pen or pencil is optional.

The Medical Reserve Corps, federally recognized since 2002 following the 9/11 attacks, is comprised of both medical and non-medical volunteers. Its mission is to support public health as well as emergency management. Currently, Massachusetts boasts 40 units, out of close to 1,000 units nationwide. Volunteers are needed to assist not only with weather events such as the recent hurricanes and the tornadoes that tore through the region in 2011, but any situations that task community resources.
